Thank you for your participation in our democracy. The information in this Candidate and Measures Guidelines book is designed to help as you prepare to run for office or engage in the ballot measure process.

- When it comes to writing statements for voters' pamphlets, candidates for State Legislature, federal office, Supreme Court and Appeals Court positions should visit www.sos.wa.gov/elections/candidates/ for rules about submitting to the State Voters' Pamphlet. Kitsap County will print your statements for the Primary, and the state will publish them for the General Election in November.
- Candidates for Kitsap County, Public Utility District and District Court positions should rely on this publication, as well as your interactions with our office, as you prepare your pamphlet statement. Your statements will run in the Kitsap County pamphlet in both the Primary and General Election.
- Residents participating with ballot measures can turn to pages 14-15 for guidelines on writing measure arguments.

Filing for Office in Kitsap County

Candidate filing week is May 16-20

Where to File for Office

RCW 29A.24.070

- Candidates for federal and state offices file with the Secretary of State, with the exception of 23rd Legislative District candidates, who file with the Kitsap County Auditor.
- Candidates for Supreme Court and Court of Appeals file with the Secretary of State.
- Candidates for countywide offices, including Kitsap County District Court, file with the Kitsap County Auditor.

Filing Electronically

Online filing allows candidates to submit their forms electronically and pay their filing fees using a credit card.

Electronic filing begins at 9 a.m., May 16 and ends at 4 p.m., May 20. For more information visit: sos.wa.gov/elections/candidates/

Filing in Person

RCW 29A.24.050

We recommend all candidates file online at sos.wa.gov/elections.

Candidates filing in Kitsap County may file **in person**, 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., May 16-20, at the Kitsap County Auditor's Office.

File by Mail or Fax

RCW 29A.24.081

- Candidates may file **by mail** beginning May 2.
- Candidates filing in Kitsap County may file **by fax** from 8 a.m., May 16 to 4:30 p.m., May 20.
- Applicable filing fees are due by the close of candidate filing on May 20.

WAC 434-208-060

Filing Fees – all filing fees are non-refundable

RCW 29A.24.091, RCW 29A.24.131

Fees are based on the salary of the office at the time of filing.

- The filing fee for an office with a salary of more than \$1,000 is 1 percent of the annual salary.
Example: The filing fee for a position with an annual salary of \$40,698 is \$406.98.
- There is a \$10 filing fee for offices with a salary of \$1,000 or less.
- There is no filing fee for unpaid positions.

Petition in Lieu of Fee

RCW 29A.24.091

Candidates may submit a Nominating Petition instead of paying the filing fee. The petition must contain one signature for every dollar of the filing fee. Signatures must be of registered voters in the district you are filing for.

Example: A petition submitted for a \$406.98 filing fee must have 406 valid signatures of registered voters within the jurisdiction of the office.

Filing for Office

Residency Requirements

- At the time of filing for office, candidates must be registered to vote in the district represented by the office they seek, with the exception of **Superior Court Judges**, who may reside anywhere in Washington state. [RCW 2.08.200](#), [RCW 42.04.020](#), [Washington State Constitution, Article 2, Section 7](#)
- **County Commissioner** and **Public Utility District Commissioner** candidates must reside within the **defined internal boundaries** of the commissioner district.

Special Filing Period

If no candidate files for a position that is scheduled for election by the deadline to withdraw, the county Auditor will call a special three-day filing period. [RCW 29A.24.181](#)

Partisan Offices

If one or more candidates file for a partisan office (except Precinct Committee Officer), the race will be included in the Primary. If after the special three-day filing period no candidate files, the vacancy is filled by appointment and is open for filing the following year.

[RCW 29A.24.191](#), [RCW 36.16.160](#)

Precinct Committee Officer

If no candidate files the vacancy is filled by appointment. If one candidate files that candidate is considered elected. If two or more candidates file the election is on the Primary ballot, with the top vote-getter considered elected.

[RCW 29A.52.171](#)

Nonpartisan Offices

If no one files for a position after the special filing period, that position will not appear on the Primary nor General Election ballots. The incumbent will serve until the next election held for that jurisdiction.

[RCW 29A.24.141](#), [RCW 29A.24.201](#), [RCW 29A.52.231](#)

District Court Judge

- If no more than two candidates file, no Primary is held for that race and the candidates will be on the General Election ballot. If no candidates file, no election shall be held for that position and the incumbent shall be considered elected. [RCW 29A.36.170](#)

Write-in Candidates

Write-in votes can only be counted for candidates who file a declaration of write-in candidacy. Write-in candidates may file for free after candidate filing week until 18 days before an election. [RCW 29A.60.021\(4\)](#)

Beginning 18 days before an election and ending at 8 p.m. on Election Day, fees apply.

- \$25 for elected positions paying less than \$1,000 annually.
- 1% of salary for elected positions paying more than \$1,000 annually.

Write-in Votes

Write-in votes are not tallied unless the total number of write-in votes could affect the outcome of the contest.

- In the Primary we would count write-in votes if there were enough that a write-in candidate could receive the second-most number of votes and advance to the General Election.
- In the General Election we would count write-in votes if there were enough that a write-in candidate could win the election.

Withdrawal Period

Any candidate may withdraw his/her candidacy in writing (Email is acceptable) no later than 4:30 p.m., May 23. There is no withdrawal period for declarations filed during a special filing period. [RCW 29A.24.131](#)

Washington State Declaration of Candidacy

how to complete the form

1. candidate information

Your name and address must match your voter registration.

Update your voter information prior to submitting a declaration of candidacy.

You are responsible for ensuring that you meet all qualifications of the office.

2. campaign information

If you do not provide campaign information, your information as a registered voter will be used.

A telephone number, email address, or website is not required, but recommended.

Government office addresses may not be used for campaigns.

3. ballot information

Print the jurisdiction, the office name and any position or district number defining the office for which you are a candidate.

The responsibility for filing for the correct office is yours.

Print your name exactly as you wish it to appear on the ballot.

Nicknames are acceptable.

Titles denoting occupations, including military rank, positions on issues, political affiliation, symbols, or anything intentionally designed to mislead voters are not acceptable.

party preference information:

For a partisan office, you may choose to state a political party that you personally prefer.

A preference does not imply that you have been nominated or endorsed by the party, or that the party approves of or associates with you.

If you choose to state a party preference, enter the name of the party (limited to 18 characters).

No changes to party preference will be accepted between the primary and the general election.

4. filing fee

Fill in the appropriate circle.

Applicable filing fees must accompany the declaration of candidacy. See a list of offices open for election for current filing fees.

If you lack sufficient funds at the time of filing, you may petition per RCW 29A.24.091 / RCW 29A.24.101.

5. oath

Read, sign, and date the oath. The declaration of candidacy is not complete and ready for submission until signed.

Duties and Qualifications of Elected Officials

U.S. Senator and Representative

Duties: The U.S. Constitution assigns the Senate and House of Representatives equal responsibility for declaring war, maintaining the armed forces, assessing taxes, borrowing money, minting currency, regulating commerce, and making all laws necessary for the operation of the government.

Qualifications: A U.S. Senator must be at least 30 years old and a U.S. citizen for nine years. A U.S. Representative must be at least 25 years old and a U.S. citizen for seven years. Both must be residents of the state from which they are elected.

U.S. Constitution, Article 1, Sections 2 & 3

Statewide Executive Offices

Duties: The Washington State Constitution, Article 3, Sections 1-24, details the duties of officials elected to state executive positions.

Qualifications: Candidate must be a citizen of the United States and a qualified voter in Washington.

U.S. Constitution, Article 1, Sections 2 & 3

State Senator, State Representative

Duties: Introduce bills during each session of the Legislature. Public hearings are held, issues are debated, and votes are taken. Bills that pass both houses of the Legislature are sent to the Governor for signature.

Qualifications: Candidate must be a citizen of the United States and a qualified voter in the district for which he or she is chosen.

Washington State Constitution, Article 2, Section 7, RCW 29A.24.075

County Commissioner

Duties: County Commissioners are the legislative body and chief administrators of the county. Adopt annual budgets and county ordinances for traffic, zoning, planning and public safety. Oversee public works, human services, community development, and parks departments. RCW 36.32

Qualifications: At the time of filing for office, candidate must be registered to vote in the district represented by the office they seek. RCW 29A.24.075

County Assessor, Auditor, Clerk, Prosecuting Attorney, Sheriff, Treasurer

Duties: Duties and responsibilities of county elected officials are prescribed by the Washington State Constitution and by the Revised Code of Washington for each individual office. Prosecuting Attorney Candidates must be registered to vote in Kitsap County and also be a lawyer admitted to the Washington State Bar.

Qualifications: At the time of filing for office, candidates must be registered to vote in the district represented by the office they seek. RCW 29A.24.075, RCW 36

Duties and Qualifications of Elected Officials

Supreme Court Justice

Duties: The Supreme Court reviews laws for consistency with the Constitution.

Qualifications: Candidate must be registered to vote and be admitted to practice in the courts of record of Washington state.
Washington State Constitution, Article 4, Section 17
RCW 29A.24.075

Appeals Court Judge

Duties: The Court of Appeals hears appeals on decisions of lower courts.

Qualifications: Candidates must be registered to vote and be admitted to practice in the courts of record of Washington State.
Washington State Constitution, Article 4, Section 17
RCW 29A.24.075

District Court Judge

Duties: The District Court has criminal jurisdiction over misdemeanor crimes, traffic infractions, criminal traffic and other non-traffic infractions as prescribed by the Washington State Constitution and by The Revised Code of Washington.
Washington State Constitution, Article 4, Section 6,

Qualifications: Candidates must be registered to vote in Kitsap County and be a lawyer admitted to the Washington State Bar.
RCW 3.34.060

Public Utility District Commissioner

Duties: Planning and study of the conservation of water and power resources for the people in Kitsap County. Work with the state Legislature and local water districts to manage the supply of water and electricity for all uses.

Qualifications: At the time of filing for office, candidate must be registered to vote in the district represented by the office they seek.
RCW 29A.24.075, RCW 54.12.010

Precinct Committee Officer

Duties: Elect a chair and vice chair of their political party's county and legislative district central committees.

Qualifications: At the time of filing for office, candidate must be registered to vote in the precinct represented by the office they seek.
RCW 29A.80.041

Publishing a Local Voters' Pamphlet

A printed copy of the Local Voters' Pamphlet is mailed to all households within the election about four weeks prior to each Primary and General Election. Statements appear in the printed Local Voters' Pamphlet and Online Ballot Access.

Submitting Your Candidate Statement

You will receive a confirmation email with a link to submit the statement once your candidate filing has been approved. You may use the link provided. If you are a candidate for a county office, we prefer you use the electronic submission method, but you may instead submit your statement directly to Kitsap County Elections. PCO candidates do not submit statements.

Statements consist of:

1. Photograph
2. Campaign Contact Information
3. Biography
4. Statement

Statement Specifications

- *Italics* may be used for emphasis.
- Bulleted lists, bold, underline, all-caps text and multiple indentations are *not* allowed and will be reformatted.
- Tables and graphs are not allowed.
- Hyphenated words count as two words unless listed as one word by dictionary.com.
- Statements exceeding the word limit are shortened by deleting full sentences from the end until the limit is reached.
- Statements containing obscene, profane, libelous or defamatory language will be rejected. [RCW 29A.32.090](#)
- **Candidate Statements must be limited to statements about the candidate himself or herself.** [RCW 29A.32.090](#), [RCW 29A.32.230\(3\)](#)

Submission Deadline

- **May 27:** Deadline for candidates to submit statements, photos.
- A final proof is provided to candidates that must be approved within three business days otherwise it is approved as submitted. [WAC 434-381-180](#)



Voters' Pamphlet deadlines are intended to promote timely publication and may be adjusted.

Statement: The period for a new election of a citizen to administer this elected office being not far distant, and the time actually arrived when your thoughts must be employed in designating the person who is to be clothed with that important trust, it appears to me proper, especially as it may conduce to a more distinct expression of the public voice, that I should now apprise you of the resolution I have formed to beg your consent in returning to elected office.

Be assured that this resolution has not been taken without a strict regard to all the considerations appertaining to the relation which binds a dutiful citizen to his country. I have the consolation to believe that, while choice, prudence and the strange reality of my newfound immortality invite me to quit the political scene, patriotism does not forbid my return. Candidate statements are not edited for grammar, punctuation or spelling by Elections staff. We recommend you have someone else read your statement before you turn it in.

1. Photograph

You may submit a self-portrait of your head and shoulders. Use a light-colored background, but not white. Photos must be no more than five years old. A color photo is preferred. Digital photos must be a minimum 300 dpi resolution and no smaller than 2.5 inches x 3 inches. Your photo may not be digitally altered.

Pins, robes, signage, uniforms or insignias suggesting the wearer has held public office are not allowed. [RCW 29A.32.110](#) Kitsap County Administrative Rules - Local Voters' Pamphlet

2. Campaign Contact Information

Candidates may submit contact information consisting of a phone number, email address, and website. Contact information does not count towards the word limit.

3. Biography

You may submit a 100-word biography using the following headings, which may be omitted:

- Elected; or Legal/Judicial Experience*
- Other Professional Experience
- Education
- Community Service

* 'Legal/Judicial Experience' heading for judicial candidates only.

4. Statement

You may submit a statement in addition to your photo, contact information and biography. Statement word limits are established by state law:

- 100 words (2 paragraphs): State Rep.
- 200 words (4 paragraphs): All other offices.

Local Voters' Pamphlet – Measures

Publishing a Local Voters' Pamphlet

A printed copy of the Local Voters' Pamphlet is mailed to all households within the election about four weeks prior to each Primary and General Election. Measure arguments appear in the printed Local Voters' Pamphlet and Online Ballot Access. [RCW 29A.32.210-280](#)

Measure arguments are published online only for Special Elections.

Committee Information

The legislative authority of a district that submits a ballot measure must appoint committees to draft arguments 'for' and 'against' the measure. Committees are limited to three members and shall appoint a chairperson as the primary point of contact. If the district is unable to appoint a committee, they must notify the Auditor's Office in writing. [RCW 29A.32.280](#)

Argument Word Limit

- 250 words (five paragraphs) including no more than four headings.
- Headings may not exceed 15 words and count towards the word limit.
- Headings are printed in bold type.

Rebuttal Word Limit

- 75 words (one paragraph).
- No headings are permitted.
- Rebuttals may only address issues raised in the opposing argument.

Argument and Rebuttal Specifications

- *Italics* may be used for emphasis.
- Bulleted lists, bold, underline, all-caps text and multiple indentations are *not* allowed and will be reformatted.
- Hyphenated words count as two words unless listed as one word by dictionary.com.
- Photographs and charts are permitted. Each square inch of chart or photograph will substitute for 50 words.
- Arguments and rebuttals exceeding the word limit are shortened by deleting full sentences from the end until the limit is reached.
- Statement containing obscene, profane, libelous or defamatory language will be rejected.



Voters' Pamphlet deadlines are intended to promote timely publication and may be adjusted.

Local Voters' Pamphlet – Measures

1. Ballot Title

The Ballot Title is submitted by the district as part of the resolution and reviewed by the Kitsap County Prosecuting Attorney for all districts *except* cities.

2. Explanatory Statement

The Explanatory Statement is prepared by the Kitsap County Prosecuting Attorney for county measures and by the attorney for the district for all other measures and submitted by the resolution deadline.

3. Arguments

Arguments 'for' and 'against' the measure are prepared by committees appointed by the district. Once approved by the Auditor's Office, arguments are provided to opposite committees to draft rebuttals.

4. Rebuttals

Committees draft rebuttals to arguments prepared by the opposite committee. Rebuttals may only address topics presented in the opposite committee's argument and may not introduce new topics.

5. Contact Information

Committee contact information must include a chairperson's name and may include two other member names, website, email, phone number, and mailing address.

Duck City: Honoring Our Favorite Birds Official Ballot Title

The City of Port Bremerbo Island adopted Ordinance No. 23 concerning the naming convention for new and existing streets under Chapter 99.99 RCW. To provide guidance and direction for the naming of new streets and renaming of existing streets, the city would catalog all duck names and name all streets after the natural names for ducks or for duck characters in fictional and non-fictional stories.

Should this proposition be:

Explanatory Statement

(Prepared by the Attorney for the district as prescribed by law.)

Proposition 1 asks voters to authorize the City of Port Bremerbo Island to begin the process of renaming every street in the city after every species of duck or after the names given ducks in movies, books and other stories, both fiction and non-fiction.

State law generally allows local jurisdictions to name streets and other areas after essentially whatever they want, and cities have been loathe to provide overt opposition. The results when it comes to streets include those named after honorable and dishonorable humans and animals and fish inferior to ducks.

Implementation of the street name changes for existing streets would take place over five to ten years, the average lifespan of a Mallard. No funding is directly allocated as part of the measure, but the estimated cost to implement the transformation in its entirety is estimated to be approximately \$178 billion, approximately \$4.5 million per household over 10 years.

The conversations you will have in the coming years will be ones you will never forget. Vote Yes on Proposition 1.

Rebuttal to the Argument Against

The study cited here was vetted by a competing marketing firm (Merchand, Aflac and Edd) and the numbers remained consistent. This measure would cost each home less than one cent per month used-car purchase per month, so it's highly affordable. Ferrets are icky. Say Yes to ducks. Say Yes to common sense. Vote Yes on Proposition 1.

Argument Against the Measure

The city had the opportunity to do something truly ambitious for an animal that deserves this kind of recognition: the ferret. Instead the council was swayed by a special interest marketing firm looking to advance its own interests.

The city is estimating it will cost \$178 billion to implement this idea, about \$4.5 million per household. We as a city do not have the means to support a worthwhile venture. To do this, for many of our residents this might present an undue burden.

Primary – Nonpartisan Offices

A Primary is held if three or more candidates file for a position. If no more than two candidates file, they appear only on the General Election ballot in the order determined by lot. [RCW 29A.52.220](#)

General Election – All Offices

If a Primary is held, candidates for all offices must receive at least 1 percent of the total votes cast for their position in order to appear on the General Election ballot.

The two candidates receiving the greatest number of votes will appear on the General Election ballot in the order of highest votes received. [RCW 29A.36.170](#)

If no Primary is held, candidates for offices that did not appear on the Primary ballot will appear on the General Election ballot in the order determined by lot.

Certification of State Candidates and Measures

The Secretary of State must certify state measures and candidates to appear on the General Election ballot by August 19.

Recounts

Mandatory Recount

A mandatory recount, by machine or hand, occurs when candidates or state measures are separated by:

- Less than 2,000 votes, AND
- Less than 1/2 of 1 percent of the votes cast. [RCW 29A.64.021](#),

Mandatory Manual Recount

For statewide offices or measures, a mandatory manual or 'hand' recount is conducted when contests are separated by:

- Less than 1,000 votes, AND
- Less than 1/4 of 1 percent of the votes cast. [RCW 29A.64.021](#),

For all other offices, ballots must be recounted by hand if the difference between the two candidates is:

- Less than 150 votes, AND
- Less than 1/4 of 1 percent of the votes cast. [RCW 29A.64.021](#),

Requests for a Recount

When a mandatory recount is not required, an officer of a political party or any person who received votes may file a written application for a recount of the votes, or a portion of the votes cast in that election for all candidates for election to that office.

- Any group of five or more registered voters may apply for a recount of the votes or a portion of the votes cast for a ballot measure. The application must specify a manual or machine recount and be submitted no later than two business days after the official certification of the election. [RCW 29A.64.011](#)
- A deposit of \$0.15 for a machine recount or \$0.25 for a manual recount for each ballot cast in the recount shall be made at the time of filing the application. The deposit shall be applied to the cost of the recount and the remaining cost, if any, will be billed to the requester. [RCW 29A.64.030](#),
