29	<ul> <li>Presents Comments received from the KC Health District</li> </ul>					
30 31	<ul> <li>Membrane (tent) structure materials are specified, this will allow metal and wood material.</li> </ul>					
32 33	<ul> <li>Change from currently allowed urban areas only to all areas of unincorporated Kitsap County</li> </ul>					
34 35	<ul> <li>Question/Answer: Karanne Gonzales-Harless asks and Mr. Baker confirms that heat sources will be allowed in shelters made of non-membrane material</li> </ul>

4	<ul> <li>SPEAKER: Noah Israel, Kingston, WA resident</li> </ul>
5	<ul> <li>Believes limiting allowed material allowed to those listed in International</li></ul>
6	Building Code (IBC) is restrictive and could eliminate potentially viable
7	alternatives.
8	<ul> <li>Natural and composite-based materials are widely used and accepted</li></ul>
9	nationally. They are durable, some fire-proof, cost effective and can provide
10	many benefits.
11	<ul> <li>A provision in code restricts structures from being site built, which is</li></ul>
12	understandable in urban environments, but in rural areas it may prohibit
13	self-help or donated labor that could help reduce cost. It is very costly to
14	move these structures from one site to another.
15	<ul> <li>SPEAKER: Nancy Olsten, Port Orchard, WA resident</li> </ul>
16	<ul> <li>Works for Kitsap Rescue Mission and is pleased to see this moving forward</li></ul>
17	as they hope to approach some local churches to see if small shelters could
18	be built on property.
19	<ul> <li>Concerned with language requiring a Type II decision to include more than</li></ul>
20	one structure per site. The cost difference is big and could be prohibitive.
21	<ul> <li>Clarification: Mr. Baker notes that a Type II would only be required for an</li></ul>
22	extension of time the structures remain in place, as that would make them
23	permanent, and then require the separate Type II process
24	<ul> <li>Question: Mr. Svensson asks about the County's thoughts about the materials</li></ul>
25	mentioned in Mr. Israel's testimony.
26	<ul> <li>Mr. Baker states composites hadn't been considered much, as the main</li></ul>
27	focus was to allow for wood and metal structures built-offsite.
28	<ul> <li>Staff sees no issue with including composites, as long as language to state:</li></ul>
29	'built to manufacturer's specifications, either on-site or off-site' is included.
30	<ul> <li>Question: Mr. Murphy asks if someone wanted to build it on their own without a kit,</li></ul>
31	using donated materials, time, expertise; paragraph 2 requires building to 'meet
32	minimum health and safety standards' would that cover it?
33	<ul> <li>Staff could include language after reference to 'manufactured</li></ul>
34	specifications' to allow for those kinds of structures as long as they meet
35	public health and safety standards
36 37 38	<ul> <li>Question/Answer: Ms. Gonzales-Harless asks and Mr. Baker confirms that DCD still has a Basic Plan that lists standard requirements for different structures, like basic houses or sheds?</li> </ul>

22 23 24		<ul> <li>Jim Bolger provides an informational update, including the announcement of the new Assistant Director and Certified Building Official, Jeff Rimack, a long-time DCD staff member who was promoted from his role as Building and Inspection Supervisor.</li> </ul>
25 26		<ul> <li>Thanks and recognition go to David Lynam for serving as Interim Assistant Director. He now returns to his role as Fire Safety Division Manager.</li> </ul>
27 28 29		<ul> <li>Mr. Bolger notes that the issue of maximum lot size, which the Planning Commission recommended approval of, came to the Board of County Commissioners for public hearing in Poulsbo on February 12.</li> </ul>
30 31		<ul> <li>Postcards went out to the 122 affected property owners who would be subject to the changes, which brought lots of speakers.</li> </ul>
32 33 34		<ul> <li>A large majority didn't even realize that there was a subdivision required – much less the details/nuances of the changes proposes. DCD arranged for additional discussion with interested individuals.</li> </ul>
35 36 37		<ul> <li>The Commissioners extended the hearing for public testimony, but did not set a date to bring this back – although a month is a likely length, and then they will provide additional direction</li> </ul>

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1 2 3 4	<ul> <li>The Commissioners may ask for more information from DCD or they may decide they are ready to reconsider once concerns are addressed, such as the accessibility to sewer and availability at which stages; also, the creation of irregular lot sizes, and others</li> </ul>
5 6 7	<ul> <li>Questions on providing relief by taking in site specific applications, but there are also issues with that – some examples of problematic areas would be Rocky Point in Bremerton and some in Tracyton.</li> </ul>
