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& Restoring Hope

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1.) ACCOMPLISHMENS TO DATE

A.) Our progress toward meeting our project goals, objectives and outcomes in our original grant application include;

Goal 1: Provide Chemical Dependency Treatment and re-entry preparation services to offenders to successfully re-enter the community.

Objective 1: Measure the number of offenders who are able to successfully complete the program.

*Assessment and Re-entry services began at the jail on November 15, 2014. On January 5, 2015 we began providing Intensive Outpatient Treatment three days weekly. To date, of the original twelve offenders in group, five have successfully completed Intensive Outpatient treatment, have been released from the jail, and all five are attending Continuing Care treatment at West Sound Treatment Center. Three of the five participants attending Continuing Care Treatment temporarily reside in our Lighthouse program and were homeless when exiting the jail.

Objective 2: Of the offenders that complete in-jail treatment, measure the numbers who have remained arrest-free for one year following release.

*N/A-This data will be available January 2016 when our first group of program participants has reached the 12-month benchmark.

Goal 2: Reduce recidivism by providing comprehensive continuing care, and support and basic need services once the offender is released into the community.

<u>Objective 1:</u> Measure the number of offenders who participate in the continuing care program.

*Five of five offenders who have successfully completed Intensive Outpatient treatment at New Start are attending Continuing Care treatment at West Sound Treatment Center. Objective 2: Of the offenders who participate in continuing care services, measure the number who have remained arrest-free for one year following discharge.

*N/A-This data will be available January 2016 when our first group of program participants has reached the 12-month benchmark.

Outcome Measures include:

- a.) Number & % of offenders who are able to successfully complete the program *Treatment began 1/5/15.
- b.) Number and % of offenders that complete in-jail treatment

 Five of twelve offenders successfully completed in-jail treatment. The remaining seven are still in jail and attending treatment.
- c.) number and % of offenders who complete in-jail treatment and remain arrest-free for one year following release
 - *NA-Treatment services began 1/5/15
- d.) Number and % of offenders who participate in the continuing care program

 Five of five offenders who have exited the jail are engaged in continuing care
 services

- e.) Number and % of offenders who have participated in continuing care services and *remain arrest-free for one year following discharge*.
- *NA- Treatment services began 1/5/15
- B.) There were three significant difficulties/problems encountered as we began to provide services in the jail;

Problem #1.) Exiting inmates are primarily returning to homelessness and though willing to go to safe and sober housing programs, there are consistently no beds available. Problem #2.) When exiting the jail, inmates have no sober social support or transportation are therefore must rely on old friends, unsafe or uninhabitable living conditions and old self-destructive supports which make staying sober and following through with Continuing Care treatment difficult, if not completely unlikely. These barriers directly affect the outcomes of our goals to provide continuing care and to support participants to remain sober and arrest free.

Problem #3.) We have received repeated inquiries from court systems and attorneys county-wide requesting Assessment services for incarcerated inmates mandated by the courts to receive assessments. According to Bremerton Municipal Court, from February 1-February 28, 2015, twenty-four defendants needing assessments were seen in the Bremerton court, 17 remain in custody in the Kitsap County Jail. All 24 of these defendants had treatment obligations that were not being followed through with. These offenders are considered 'frequent flyers' by the courts as they have been ordered repeatedly to attend assessment appointments and/or treatment in the community with no success. Their barriers include trauma, homelessness, mental illness, unemployability, and a host of other behavioral health conditions. They are the hardest to serve clients that repeatedly cycle through the emergency rooms, detox, and mental health and jail/prison systems.

Currently the New Start program is completely voluntary and limited to three full-time employees providing Intensive Outpatient Treatment in the jail and Continuing Care at our Outpatient facility. We are proposing an expansion of our current services at the jail to secure an additional full-time employee that would provide mandated assessment services at the jail. This would allow us to provide court-ordered critical assessment and brief intervention services to this hard to serve population and is in direct alignment with our New Start program Goals 1-3, and the Continuum of Care Policy Goal to; provide on-site (via the jail) behavioral health screening and referral to Superior, Municipal and District Courts. Offenders served by the Assessment Counselor could also be eligible to voluntarily apply for participation in New Start Intensive Outpatient Treatment and Re-entry services.

In response to the above problems and in alignment with the Continuum of Care Policy Goals to; (increasing the number of stable housing options for chemically dependent and mentally ill residents of Kitsap County and reducing the number of people in Kitsap County who recycle through our criminal justice systems including jails and prisons), our proactive approach was to:

<u>Problems #1 & #2:</u> Contact our County Coordinator to re-direct a portion of 2014's program budget to open New Start House which will provide eight transitional housing beds to men exiting the jail for 6-9 months until more permanent housing is secured. Transportation from the jail the day participants are released will be provided by a part-time Housing Case Manager who will assist those exiting the jail with access to partner agencies, treatment and supportive services. New Start House opens April 1, 2015. As a stop-gap, we are currently housing three participants who successfully completed Intensive Outpatient in the jail, at our Lighthouse housing program until the April 1st opening of New Start House.

<u>Problem #3:</u> Meet with Judge James Docter and his team, Ned Newlin Chief of Corrections, and the New Start Clinical Team to discuss and develop a plan to expand New Start service delivery to include *court-ordered* assessment services to incarcerated offenders who are mandated to have an assessment and are in the Kitsap County Jail. Once assessed, offenders may *choose* also to *voluntarily* apply for the following services (if eligible); Intensive Outpatient treatment, Re-entry services, and Continuing Care services. Should this critical expansion be approved, we anticipate serving approximately 120 additional inmates (in addition to the 160 we anticipate serving currently through New Start).

C.) The *New Start* program is closely integrated with its many community partner programs and provides collective impact by working toward the common goal of creating a continuum of services for our mutual participants. One example of the collective impact we have achieved is with our quarterly community partner agency meetings. These meetings support ongoing continuous communication, the sharing of information and data, the problem solving of emergent concerns and challenges, and consensus when making changes to our service delivery thereby ensuring the best outcomes for our mutual participants. New Start utilizes an inclusive service delivery approach and our current community partner agencies include;

Housing - Compass House, Fresh Start Naval House, Benedict House, O'Hana House, The Lighthouse, YWCA (Alive Shelter), Agape' Unlimited's Sisyphus and Koinonia Inn, Kitsap Community Resources, Coffee Oasis, and Kitsap Mental Health. Mental Health Screening Services- Kitsap Mental Health. Medical care-Peninsula Community Health Services. Vocational Assessment and Skill-building- Compass Vocational Services, and Kitsap Community Resources. Emergency Basic-need Services- The Salvation Army, Abraham's House, West Sound Treatment Center. Inpatient, Outpatient and Continuing Care Chemical Dependency Treatment- West Sound Treatment Center

(MRT), Kitsap Mental Health (co-occurring disorder), Kitsap Recovery Center (Inpatient and Detox), Agape' Unlimited (Outpatient with licensed child-care).

Letters of commitment and MOU's outlining specific provision of services are in place for the majority of our partner agencies. By working together as a community we create lasting change, our participants gain significantly improved access to invaluable community resources, and individual and community outcomes are improved.

D.) Summary of Key Program Accomplishments and Conclusions to date include;

- 77 people have received services since the program launched in November,
 2014
- 25 Individuals received an Assessment for participation in Intensive Outpatient Treatment services while in Jail. Of those:
 - o 5 Individuals did not qualify for the New Start program.
 - o 20 Individuals qualified and enrolled into in jail IOP Treatment. Of those:
 - 5 have been discharged due to behavior or legal issues
 - 2 aborted IOP
 - 5 completed IOP in jail, have been released from jail and have reentered into After Care services: Of those
 - 3 men now residing at WSTC Lighthouse for men
 - 8 are presently attending IOP
 - 3 new participants are scheduled to enter IOP services in jail on 3/17/2015.
- 43 Individuals have received Re-Entry Planning Services. Of Those:
 - o 31 received only Re-Entry Services (no IOP treatment while in jail)
 - 8 have had substance abuse treatment referrals
 - 1 female now enrolled in IOP at WSTC
 - o 7 have received housing referrals
 - 13 have received medical referrals
 - o 3 have received "other" referrals

Total IOP Services received by participants since November 2014:

- 156.5 hours of 1:1 Continued Stay Review/Individual Service Plan Review.
- 492.0 hours of Group IOP Treatment
- 86.25 hours of Re-Entry planning/coordination/referral hours

Actual services began at the jail on November 15th, 2014. Data collected reflects only four months of service delivery and outcome information. We look forward to providing the committee a more thorough and comprehensive assessment of our qualitative and quantitative data as we approach the one—year mark in November, 2015.

Conclusions about the success of New Start and its impact in the community:

- Re-entry services are much more in demand than previously anticipated. These
 re-entry services are paramount to the successful outcomes of our participants
 and tasks were shifted to address this need. As a result, community resources
 are being utilized at a higher rate than originally anticipated.
- When accessing re-entry services to prepare for exiting the jail, the majority of New Start participants are chronically homeless and in dire need of ongoing community resources and supports such as; Continuing Care treatment, housing, transportation, medical care, basic need resources-food, clothing, etc. The ability of us and our partners to provide these supports will directly affect the successful outcomes of our participants.
- New Start has met all of the Milestones thus far of the original Project Timeline and is on target to serve 160 inmates as originally identified.

As we continue to compile qualitative and quantitative data regarding programmatic and community impact outcomes, we anticipate areas of impact will include the health, housing, vocational and social support needs of our participants and this will translate into less visits to emergency rooms, the mental health crises system, a lower recidivism rate at the Kitsap County Jail. We also anticipate an improved shared support system for participants *and* our community partners as we continue serving as a catalyst for closer partnerships by modeling an inclusive and collaborative approach to providers community wide.

2.) Budget

A. Budget line item expenditures to date (July 1, 2015-February 28, 2015) include total salaries and benefits: \$42,430, Fringe Benefits \$7,200, Equipment \$2,200, Office Supplies (paper, postage and general office supplies) \$420, Audit/Accounting \$63, Professional fees and Taxes \$163, Indirect Admin. \$1,070, Cash Assistance \$15,000, Training/Travel and MRT Materials \$2,894. Total expenditures to date =\$71,440

Unexpended grant funds to date include;

Manager/Staff \$61,776, Audit/Accounting 1,937, Office Supplies \$80, Communication \$600, Professional Fees and Taxes \$12,192, Indirect Admin. \$9,298, Insurance \$500, Staff Training/Travel and MRT Materials \$2,506, Transportation \$1,000, and Lab fees \$2,325 for a total of \$92,214 remaining funds on our contract balance and we are expending funds at the anticipated rate with the exception of Salaries and Benefits as our original calculations reflected a 12-month period however our New Start staff were hired during the second and third quarters of the grant period. We anticipate unexpended funds for Salaries and Benefits in the approximate amount of \$33,576 as a result.

* With permission and direction from the County Coordinator, two budget line item dollar amounts were shifted; from Fringe Benefits (\$7,200) and from Cash Assistance to Clients (\$15,000) for a total of \$22,200, moved to the Equipment line item (\$17,400) to purchase a used van and eight beds, dressers, a dining room table and couch for New Start House. Rent was created as line item (\$4,800). These changes did not affect the Project Budget Total overall.

B. Funding Need and Milestones for Budget Period July 1, 2015- June 30, 2016: Budget line items include total salaries, benefits and payroll taxes: \$172,180, Equipment \$1,000, Office Supplies (paper, and general office supplies) \$600, Professional fees \$2,700, Audit/Accounting \$2,000, Insurance (facility and professional liability) \$3,000, Training and MRT Material \$1,100, Indirect Administrative Fees (oversight, reporting and management) \$16,649, Fees & Taxes \$5,000, Utilities \$6,000, Facility Rent \$14,400, Lab Fees \$2,000 (urinalysis testing while in continuing care treatment). Fuel (gas for van to transport) \$750, Other Incentives/Cash Assistance \$2,000- funds go toward accessing community resources on behalf of offenders including but not limited to; bus passes, food, (interim-until DSHS food stamps can be attained), GED testing fees, college accu-placer fees, misc. certifications i.e. flagger, CNA re-certification, forklift driver certification, food handlers card, clothing, car repair, brief interim prescribed medication and medical care (emergency only-until medical benefits can be secured). All other community funding resources will be exhausted prior to being eligible to apply for cash assistance funding through New Start. Offenders requesting cash assistance will complete an application outlining need and where the funds will be expended. Offenders must provide receipts for expended cash assistance.

WSTC will provide in-kind services and invest resources to the *New Start* program as follows; Salaries and benefits-\$4,000, Office Supplies-\$600, Training/MRT Material \$1,400, Lab Fees \$300, Fuel (for van to transport) \$250, Incentives/Cash Assistance-\$500, Limited interim continuing care services until other resources are secured-\$10,000. Total WSTC committed in-kind \$17,050.

- C.) Significant changes to the proposed budget for the next funding period resulting from the modification of project activities are:
 - Additional Salary for one full-time assessment counselor added to provide approximately 12 on-site mandated Assessments per week and brief intervention at the Kitsap County Jail increasing number of offenders served from 160 to 280.
 - Added Rent, and utilities for New Start House establishing eight additional transitional housing beds for individuals with Behavioral Health issues moving from jail to treatment and a part-time salary for housing case manager/transportation staff to provide supportive services including 1:1 goal planning and counseling and recovery coaching.
 - Incentives/Cash for rental Assistance has been reduced from \$15000 to \$2,000.

3.) Sustainability

A. Leveraged funding (not including in-kind) is crucial to WSTC's sustainability plan. Leveraged funding for New Start this last budget period included federal Medicaid funding for five participants currently attending Continuing Care treatment and Compass Vocational Services. While incarcerated, offenders are not eligible for Affordable Care Act funds however, thus far, 100% of New Start participants engaged in Continuing Care services at WSTC after exiting the jail have been eligible to receive health insurance benefits through the Federal Medicaid/Affordable Care Act that cover the

majority of the cost of Continuing Care treatment and Compass Vocational Services as part of their treatment.

Also, WSTC also continues to fully maximize in-kind services from our programs and from the programs of our community partners. The majority of our participants are considered low-income or very low-income. Since the onset of treatment services in the jail New Start and its participants have received the following in-kind services; Interim Continuing Care Services at WSTC (\$1,800), housing for three New Start participants at our Lighthouse program from 3/1-3/31/15 (\$600), donated household items for New Start House \$2,500, Mental Health Counseling services WSTC MHC (\$150), DSHS food stamps, and Housing and Essential Needs (\$Amt. unknown at this time). Other basic need items such as clothing and hygiene products are donated by our community partners i.e. Salvation Army, and Abraham's House, Bremerton Food Bank, So. Kitsap Foodline, etc. Financial assistance from Department of Social and Health Services is available to secure food stamps, and Housing and Essential Needs (HEN) may be available for rental assistance (in limited cases). Our participants have access to Kitsap Mental Health, and Peninsula Community Health Services with their medical coupons, and Kitsap Community Resource programs due to their low-income status.

For nine consecutive years WSTC has developed an aggressive annual Fund Development Plan which is updated in July of each year researching and outlining potential private, foundation, and government grants. Research areas for 2015-2016 include; Department of Justice and SAMHSA who frequently provide re-entry and continuing care dollars for innovative programs that serve vulnerable populations utilizing best practice models, and potential foundation grants for health and wellness and vulnerable populations. Grant applications are developed and submitted throughout the year according to the submission guidelines of funders. As a result, WSTC has a diverse and comprehensive funding base.

- B.) We have been very successful in leveraging Federal Medicaid Funds through the Affordable Care act. Currently, of the approximate 100 participants engaged in Outpatient or Continuing Care Treatment services at WSTC, 93% are eligible for and have secured Federal Medicaid/Affordable Care Act funding that covers the majority of their cost for these treatment services. We have developed a sustainability plan based on the following formula; *Leadership+Adaptability+Program Capacity=Sustainability*. WSTC has maintained financial adaptability by seeking a diverse funding base and taking decisive action when faced with challenges. Federal Medicaid funding is a large part of our sustainability plan.
- C. Our preliminary plan for how New Start will continue in years 2-5 includes 1.) Continue to apply for the 1/10th of 1% tax dollars to sustain the *New Start* program moving forward. These important funds will serve as leverage to; 2.) Gain additional government, private and foundation resources in alignment with our Fund Development

Plan. Other potential resources in years 2-5 include; Federal Medicaid Funds for New Start participants exiting the jail to North Kitsap. Our North Kitsap branch opens April 1, 2015 in Poulsbo and will create increased access to services in North Kitsap to our participants with medical coupons 3.) There are several local government grants that may be of significant assistance to our New Start project in years 2-5, including Community Development Block Grant, Homeless Housing Grant Funds, Affordable Housing Grant Funds, and Consolidate Housing Grant. These grant programs have partnered with us in the past and recognize WSTC for our innovative programs, sound financial practices, and our ability to maximize leveraged resources. 3.) We will apply for private and foundation grants that focus on individuals with multiple barriers including; incarceration, un-employability, substance use disorders, trauma, and other barriers that exacerbate the behavioral health conditions of our population.

Dear Citizen's Advisory Committee Members,

I am pleased to write this letter in support of expanding the New Start program. Having worked exclusively in criminal justice for over 26 years in Bremerton and Port Orchard, I am intimately familiar with its successes and failures. The vast majority of inmates in the Kitsap County jail need alcohol/drug assessments and treatment. Without a doubt, the biggest need in the effort to reduce recidivism and rehabilitate offenders exists in successfully transitioning these offenders back into the community, so they may live sober lives and be law abiding. Historically this transition has suffered precisely because offenders fail to access and utilize the services necessary to realize their goals to maintain sobriety, begin treatment and establish stability once they leave the jail. They get "sidetracked". Until the New Start program began last year, most of these offenders hit the streets without the transitional housing or resources needed to enable them to maintain sobriety and effectively begin to access services. This is almost always a roadmap for failure.

Even with the initiation of the New Start program, shortfalls remain. The Kitsap County jail is continually recycled with offenders who have been unable to follow the courts' directives, or otherwise have failed to obtain chemical dependency assessments or comply with treatment. Until they succeed, many of these offenders will continue to endanger the public, and be returned to custody facing probation violations and new charges.

Naturally, the initial step towards complying with court orders in alcohol related cases is the alcohol assessment. Unfortunately, even this simple step is often tripped up by barriers of many varieties (including finances, transportation and housing) for many offenders in need. Providing assessments in jail will remove these barriers and greatly improve the success of our efforts to guide offenders to the help they require. Early meetings with chemical dependency counselors in a sober setting will insure a healthy and productive beginning. Inmates with the tools and education provided by New Start will have a significantly greater chance of success once they are released from custody, and the sooner they begin this process the better. This program is a very wise and promising investment. I urge you to authorize the requested expenditure to enable New Start to expand its scope as described. Thank you for considering my input, and thank you for your efforts to make Kitsap County a better place for all of us.
